The ALA were excited and honoured to host international educational consultant Jill Eggleton for our Term 2 Seminar. Jill reminded us that our learners should be exposed to poetry on a daily basis so children can build passion, excitement and enjoyment from the spoken to written language. Children are able to catch the rhythm of the language and feel the power of the words! She reinforced the importance of rhyme, rhythm, repetition and rich language where children can paint pictures with words weaved with emotions as its beating, emotional heart at its core. Acquiring a wide vocabulary and understanding rhythm are essential elements in literacy acquisition and these skills need to remain a focus for our 21st Century learners.
