- 1. Children have the basic human right to read.

- 5. Children have the right to read for pleasure.
- 6. Children have the right to supportive reading environments with knowledgeable literacy partners.
- Children have the right to extended time set aside for reading.
- Children have the right to share what they learn through reading by collaborating with others locally and globally.
- Children have the right to read as a springboard for other forms of communication, such as writing, speaking, and visually representing.
- 10. Children have the right to benefit from the financial and material resources of governments, agencies, and organizations that support reading and reading instruction.
