Murray shares an illustrated presentation of being an effective teacher of writing (Year 1 - Year 8) and is supported by classroom stories from three Auckland teachers.



Dr. Murray Gadd works nationally and internationally as a literacy facilitator, researcher and teacher. For the Ministry of Education, he was one of the writers of "Effective Literacy Practice Years 5 - 8, the English section of the New Zealand Curriculum, and the English Exemplars

His most recent research (on working proficiently at instructional writing with Year 5 - 8 priority learners; published by NZCER in 2018) was undertaken with Professor Judy Parr and 23 teachers at five diverse New Zealand schools. 

Report: 2020 ALA Gala Dinner Event with Alan Duff

10th November 2020

ALA finished the year on a high with a conversation with author Alan Duff. Alan recently released a new book, **A Conversation with my Country**, and this framed his talk.

Alan shared his relentless passion for kiwi children to be exposed to the power of reading, empowering their learning so they can all reach their potential. He shared how he became the writer he is, the highs and the lows. An environment of violence, anger and feelings of humiliation. And the contrast? His father surrounding him with positive ideals, education and books that forged his love of writing and the written word.

In 1992 Alan became aware of the numbers of 'bookless homes' after a visit to Camberley School, Hastings. From this, an idea developed to create opportunities for children to own books that they could share at home with whanau. Alan has worked enthusiastically for children like the ones he met at Camberley ever since. His writing successes placed him in a position where he could do something positive for children who came from homes where there were few books.

The Alan Duff Charitable Foundation Books in Homes began in 1994. Alan found like-minded people with drive and commitment, starting with Christine Fernyhough setting up an office at Mainfreight. Scholastic came on board and it soon became **Duffy Books in Homes**. Having his name linked was not what Alan wanted, however the Duffy name has now been linked to Books in Homes for over 25 years. Alan likes to go big and go hard and he definitely has. In 2020, there are over 200 other funding partners, more than 520 schools, 280 early childhood centres, and over 12 million books have been distributed to over 100,000 children. Duffy Books in Homes has grown international wings and spread overseas to the USA and Australia.

Alan shared his desires for children in NZ especially those with an upbringing similar to his own. He wanted them to be in a place where they could 'dream big' for parents to put them first, back them to the hilt and not let them down, for families to share rituals around reading, simply snuggling in and reading a book from when children are young. The rewards are two way, youngsters and parents experiencing joy and a positive reaction to the cadence of a voice reading, bringing text to life and enhancing a love of time together and reading.

Alan spoke about finding the right people, the stalwarts who get stuck in and get involved, and how teachers can be that person for their students. He suggested that schools are safe places for children, especially those who always arrive early and leave late. Children are at school for six hours a day so teachers can make important messages count and be powerful, and school can be the place where they are put first. Teachers are in a place of influence so need to be understanding, model positivity, resilience and show pride in students and their achievements.

Alan asked us to **look in the mirror** and left us considering the messages we give, what more we can do and be better at for the children in our care. A thought provoking and entertaining evening.
